Did You Know

Over 125,000 people in our region live in poverty, including one in five children.

That's 14.4% of the population in WNC that have income below the poverty level.

Nearly 4,000 people in our region are living in houses without complete kitchens or plumbing according to a Western North Carolina Housing Assessment, conducted by Dogwood Health Trust.

Complete plumbing is defined as having running hot and cold water, a flush toilet, and a bathtub or shower.

Building Towards Home Safety

Partnering is essential for safe housing in WNC

For the past five years, WNC Bridge Foundation has been hammering at the problem many in Western North Carolina face: safe housing. Since 2019, we have awarded

7 IMPACT Grants, 8 NOW Grants, and have focused our AIM Grant and Community Initiatives resources to address this daunting issue. Through conversations with

our trusted non-profit partners, collaborations with funders, and building a solid referral network, including departments from health and human services and school systems, WNC Bridge is working to ensure our neighbors can access safe housing.

Thanks to a \$200,000 investment from Dogwood Health Trust, WNC Bridge was able to pool Dogwood Health's funds along with our WNC Greatest Needs Community Initiative funding to increase the number of people served over the last calendar year. WNC Bridge served more than 90 people, including 23 children, providing essential housing needs to our neighbors.





CRITICAL NEEDS

Home safety modifications

continue to increase in requests throughout the region as our population ages, and items such as bathroom grab bars frequently need to be professionally installed for people who live alone or are physically unable to install them after surviving strokes or other life events impacting their mobility. These modification costs are often out of reach for under and

uninsured people in our region. WNC Bridge's donor-supported Greatest Needs Fund helped make many of these requests possible.

Urgent home repair

for very low-income people is also a tremendous need. WNC Bridge quickly responded to conditions created by gaps federal funds do not cover, including the installation of modifications on specific residences, pest control payment, and rental assistance.

A Fresh Start

Unsafe bathroom receives makeover

Lisa Messer, a school social worker in McDowell County, reached out to WNC Bridge Foundation to assist in providing home repairs for a family of three living in unsafe conditions. She shared that the children were straight-A students being bullied at school due to hygiene issues. After speaking with the children's guardian, Lisa learned the family could not bathe regularly due to major repairs needed in the home's only bathroom.

The guardian invited Lisa to meet at the family's 600-square-foot two-bedroom home, where she could evaluate safety issues preventing the bathroom from being functional. Lisa confirmed

the bathroom floor was caving in and falling apart, and the toilet was sitting on plywood. Black mold was also growing in the bathroom.

Over 200 homes in McDowell County have incomplete indoor kitchens or plumbing.*

WNC Bridge partnered with another home repair group to purchase materials to completely refit the bathroom and appliances, as well as install a low-entry shower for the guardian's safety. WNC Bridge Foundation also provided funds for the quardian to purchase clothing for the children so they could feel confident in their fresh start.

Public health fellow will focus on healthy homes

WNC Bridge has been grateful to learn alongside experts in our region regarding housing needs in Western North Carolina. In the coming year, WNC Bridge will continue focusing on The Green & Healthy Homes Initiative. This national program addresses social determinants of health, opportunity, and equity by creating healthy, safe, and energy-efficient homes.

Jazmyne Boyd has joined WNC Bridge as part of the 2023 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Public Health Associate Program. As a public health fellow, Jazmyne will establish and implement a home visiting program to help people with severe respiratory problems like COPD and asthma live safely and healthfully in their homes.

When you can't be home, Rathbun House provides more than meets the eye



Rathbun House's doors are open 365 days a year to welcome individuals who need a safe and peaceful place to stay while their loved ones receive care at local healthcare facilities. Besides free lodging for 14 days, Rathbun House provides other safety amenities, including a complimentary shuttle service and security on the property from 8 p.m. until 8 a.m. daily.

Staff, volunteers, local businesses, and former guests support Rathbun House in countless ways, including providing holiday meals. It is not uncommon for Rathbun House to receive gift cards and donations of food throughout the year.

A Home for Everyone

CHC of Madison County addresses affordable housing crisis

Community Housing Coalition (CHC) of Madison County is a non-profit organization that has promoted healthy, safe, and affordable housing for over 20 years in a mountain county where 25% of residents live in substandard housing. CHC is the only agency in Madison County providing services at no expense to its low-income clients, most of whom come from underserved populations, including older adults, differently abled, single parents (or grandparents), and veterans.

WNC Bridge Foundation awarded CHC a three-year capacity grant to support the organization's Affordable Replacement Housing Program, which aims to replace substandard housing for homeowners living at or below 80% or area medium income. The need to replace people's older

homes is directly tied to the fact that nearly all of CHC's clients live in stick-built houses built before 1940 or in mobile homes. Older mobile homes make up one-quarter of Madison County's housing stock. Though affordable at the time of

purchase, mobile homes typically require major repairs within 20 years, including roof replacement, electrical overhaul, and new flooring.

Community Housing Coalition's Affordable Replacement Housing Program was launched in 2022 to provide new construction replacement homes for clients whose homes cannot be repaired. Partnering with WNC Bridge Foundation, Asheville Regional Housing Consortium, and Dogwood Health Trust, the goal is to build four energy-efficient homes by the end of 2024, leveraging existing water, electric, and septic systems. WNC Bridge funds are providing salary support to CHC's house replacement manager, Matthew Bennet, who oversees the development, design, and construction of the homes.

> Celina Uribe is the program's first replacement home recipient. CHC had provided frequent urgent repairs to Uribe's former home, including roofing and plumbing overhauls. Uribe shared with The Asheville Citizen-Times. "I feel really blessed and honored that I was given this

opportunity. It's an amazing program that I'm so excited about, and so proud that our county is taking part in this program and that Community Housing Coalition is leading the force in affordable housing in this community."

Helping Finn move safely

Three-year-old Finn Culler of Hendersonville was born with a rare brain malformation, polymicrogyria, causing him to experience severe epilepsy, resulting in as many as ten seizures a day. In February 2022, Finn underwent surgery, which has been successful in preventing additional seizures. However. the surgery has caused severe weakness in one side of Finn's body.



WNC Bridge Foundation's Children's Services Fund provided Finn with a mobility device called Scooot. Finn's mother, Lauren, told us. "The difference the Scooot has made for Finn is enormous. He can now move freely through our

home and community with ease. We have several dogs, and before receiving his Scooot, Finn did not enjoy our pets at all. The dogs would give him kisses, but he felt overwhelmed by their presence as he could not escape them. Now he loves on our fur babies and enjoys spending time with his dogs."

In addition to providing mobility for Finn, the Scooot also helps strengthen his legs. "The near constant use of both legs to motor himself around in his Scooot has strengthened Finn's muscles tremendously. He is now pulling himself into a standing position and even cruises on furniture when not using his Scooot," Lauren shares.

Finn is putting his increasing strength to good use; he loves to play hide and seek with his big brother Grayson. "Every time Finn finds his big brother, laughter fills our home. I cannot thank WNC Bridge supporters enough for
